Final High Performance Driver Education School of the Season

What a great weather day as we started off for HPDE #4 at Waterford Hills Raceway which, sad to say, was our last HPDE for the year. We began with drivers arriving nice and early to get registered and make it to pit lane for the track walk at 8:30 AM. As we conduct the track walk we point out the different slopes of the road, the

turn-in apex and track-out cones. We also discuss passing zones, braking zones and other things to pay attention to that you may not notice as you go around the track at speed. As we finish the lap around the track I have multiple drivers telling me how great the information was and how it will help them once they are driving their cars on the track.



After the track walk, next is the Driver's Meeting to explain all the rules and procedures that need to be followed when running on the track. On this day, 9/11/21, we also had a minute of silence to remember all of the losses our country suffered on this day 20 years ago. After the Driver's Meeting, we start with classroom instruction for our Tour and Green groups while the instructors get ready to go on track for their first session. 911 Secrets

Our Porsche cars each come with certain idiosyncrasies or characteristics that give them a special character, sort of like car secrets if you will. The early 356 models had a certain feel to their driving feedback. That translated to a different feel with the next generation, the 911/912. Subsequent chassis modifications such as longer wheelbase or wider track and certainly wider wheels each altered the driving feel of that model.

From the very beginning of Porsche, so called car experts held strong opinions about the driving characteristics of certain models of the cars. Writers were quick to attach labels and generalizations to certain models. Some labels stuck to certain model lines over several engineering generations of cars. Such a label was attached to the 911 line as having snap oversteer to the point that the car was difficult, if not outright dangerous, to drive. Having owned and driven more than one 911 since 1971 I found this label odd and incorrect. The 911 was born as a short wheelbase and narrow tired car that had some handling quirks such as a propensity for oversteer. It was a fact that to cure some odd handling, new cars came from the factory with lead weights bolted to the inside of the front bumper. Those quickly were dispensed with after some minor suspension changes which gave the 911 very predictable and neutral handling behaviors. The factory quickly adopted a slightly longer wheelbase, which shifted forward the location of the engine and gave the car a very neutral polar moment of inertia. That polar moment made the car much less likely to oversteer. For whatever reason, most auto journalists choose to ignore that change and still labeled the 911 as dangerous for well over a decade. Then along came the 1976 Turbo, it was quickly labeled the widow maker based on early history of crashes. I have driven a 1976 Turbo and all I can fault the car for is that the power is addictive. It did not handle any different than my 1972 911E. The only fault I found was that once turbo boost had built up, a sudden lifting off the gas did not take effect until the boost level dropped. This was subsequently fixed with pop off valves, but the label hung on through several generations of Turbo even the 996 Turbo that I had more track experience driving. In fact, it was very easy to deal with chronic understeer. Changing some suspension components on the 996 Turbo to GT3 pieces actually made the car into a spectacular track car.

The first 911 secret I learned came as a surprise with my 1969 911S Targa. I discovered it originally came with

front Boge Hydro pneumatic self-leveling shock absorbers. I suppose it was a concession for a more comfortable ride and the ability to load luggage in the trunk. The surprise was that the car did not have front torsion bar springs or sway bars as the shocks did all the work. While the car had decent performance it had considerable roll and unpredictable response to steering. I had the car converted to a conventional front suspension, but the dealer was adamant that such a swap would result in cracking the very big and expensive rear window due to chassis flex. In fact, this never happened and if anything the chassis flex did a wonderful job of planting all four tires on the ground. The next 911 secret came with my next 911, an E model coupe. As delivered, the nose sat rather high in the air due to DOT headlight height requirements. I was told the dealer was prohibited from changing the ride height, but I could change the height myself with hand tools and a ruler. The front torsion bars had a simple adjustable level stop and in minutes the height and subsequent chassis rake were corrected. This gave the car a better look and more responsive steering. When I converted the car to a Carrera RS tribute, the suspension was dramatically changed to racing Koni shocks, Weltmeister adjustable sway bars, plus Carrera torsion bars and wider wheels. But the surprise was the addition of bump steer steering rack spacers which eliminated the steering wheel twitch when hitting bumps. Another secret was the addition of a front suspension tower brace that improved steering response. The final surprise was the addition of a shoulder seat belt brace tying the two upper mounts together and giving the car structure more stiffness. All of these changes transformed what once was claimed to be a dangerous handling car into one that is very confidence inspiring, responsive, predictable and with neutral handling.

This brings us to the point of asking how it is done. It is my experience that much of the handling traits come down to alignment and tires. My 911 is shod with Toyo Proxis R1R tires and has the best alignment it has ever had thanks to Howard Gilson. I know that a proper suspension alignment can make any poor handling car into a good handling car and vice versa. These generations of 911 continue on to the present day. Now besides mechanical changes, there is the introduction of computer dynamics. Newer suspension designs call for updated suspension alignment specifications and techniques. The secrets to good handling 911s are no longer an unknown and the 911 is as capable as every super car on the market.





The Inaugural American Speed Festival at M1 Concourse

Google defines Festival as a "gathering of people to celebrate something," such as heritage, culture and traditions, AND states that "attending a Festival with your best friends means having GREAT experiences that you'll be talking about for years to come".

The dynamic demonstrations allowed you to see and hear the cars performing at speed on the M1 track and experience the sounds and excitement of their performance capabilities.

There was something for everyone in the range of vehicles presented, including four of the most historically significant cars designed, constructed and raced by the featured Marque, Chaparral. Each represented a significant milestone in the evolution of racecar aerodynamics from the inventive mind of Designer, Constructor, and Racer Jim Hall. The 2E and 2F introduced the use of wings to racing in the late 60's, and was followed in 1979 by the 2K IndyCar, also known as the Yellow Submarine, which was created by legendary F1 designer, John Barnard. It incorporated full-length underbody tunnels to the rear wing to provide downforce along with many other outstanding design detail innovations such as the structural execution of the rear wing sub frame. In all, sixteen IndyCars were included among the

entries, ranging from a front engine 1952 Kurtis roadster to the Unser 1986 Lola. In addition Can Am cars, stock cars, super cars, performance cars (American, European and Asian), endurance racing cars, and a significant number of other featured cars were included among the show entries. Another of the historically significant featured cars was the original 1953 Duntov Corvette mule, which was built to test a V8 engine in a Corvette that began the evolutionary process that led to the Corvette as we know it today.

Waiting for traffic to clear so I could test-drive a Porsche Taycan southbound on Gratiot Avenue took forever. To my left, dozens of cars kept coming in groups of two and three but then it was time to get-up-and-go with the traffic stopped by the light. To my right, it was open road for at least a quarter mile, maybe more. I made the turn and was in the center lane where I slammed the accelerator to the floor. We were thrown back into our seats with the lurch of gravity resistance -- G-Force - that left us motionless. The Taycan is an electric car, not a rocket, but Porsche calls the over-boost system "Launch Control" with a combined 522 horsepower and a top speed of 155 mph.

The 5000-pound machine of Porsche technology, muscle and a hybrid light-weight aluminum-steel body sped south where we were free of police and other cars at 10:30 on a sunny Saturday morning in the summer. Laughter, smiles and shaking our heads from the four of us feeling the unreal power surge.

With my sons, Jason and Bryan in the back seat and my brother, Roger, an automotive engineer, as the front passenger, we sat in a Black Metallic, Bordeaux Interior, 2021 Porsche Taycan 4S courtesy of Porsche of the Motor City Dealership in Eastpointe, Michigan.

We drove a short distance to the south, turned left at a crossover and then north on Gratiot where we stopped for a traffic light, waited for a green signal and were off again. Another quarter mile north on Gratiot we stopped in a parking lot and switched positions. Jason now at the steering wheel feeling the road, touching the controls on the instrument panel that was lit up with many colors, square symbols moving left to right. Traffic cleared. Jason punched the pedal and he was off testing the Taycan for its handling and power. In his words-- "It was flat. Quiet. No body roll. It was fun." Bryan was next and said the Taycan, "... handled nice" as he made a Michigan left at 40 miles an hour. "It hugged the road and my eyes were pushed back into my head. I had a feeling of what the astronauts went through going to the moon." Roger's head and back were pushed into the headrest and seat. "This car is different. I've never driven anything like that. It was just a big, unexpected thrill and I had a big smile on my face." He was most impressed with the smooth and controlled driving.

We sat in seats over the power station of individual battery packs that made up the floor. SEM member Dave Renner, Dealer Customer Experience Manager for Porsche of the Motor City, said the pack, "... requires a ten-foot-

wide door in the shop so a forklift can move the battery powered electric motor using special designed Porsche Equipment to lift the entire pack into place." Porsche has a 100,000 mile high-voltage battery warranty for the power plant of 390 Kilowatts (kW) of raw electricity for the 522 horsepower (HP).

Michael Moore, Sales Manager for Porsche of the Motor City says the Taycan charges to 80% capacity in 22 minutes using a DC current to charge from the right or passenger side of the car. Moore said that Porsche includes, "... an icon in the Infotainment center on the instrument panel showing the battery temperature to inform the owner of the best time to begin charging."

He added, "The Taycan includes a mobile AC charger and a 120 Volt supply cable for charging. There is a time-out device or profile timer to accommodate different times to start and end charging such as in the evenings. Porsche recommends a 220 volt outlet. Today, the Taycan can be leased with three years of free charging through Electrify America Stations throughout the country."

The dashboard with the instrument panel is a curved display with touchscreen controls in front of the driver. It is digital, glowing color that is always in motion displaying different information updates from the onboard computers.




The Taycan includes Lane and Park assist plus cruise control using the onboard camera system. Porsche Communication Management responds to voice commands. There is a system for 3D maps with real-time traffic and route calculation with views of charging stops. A vehicle tracking system for theft detection is available on a 24/7 basis. Glass is thermally insulated and the Taycan has Porsche Connect Service for wireless coverage.


Southeast Michigan Porsche Club Member, Jeff Topf also drove the Taycan that morning and has driven many EV's including those from BMW, Tesla, GM. Jeff said "The Taycan outperformed. The Taycan felt like I was driving a 911. It had that feel to it. It's a neat car. Beside the straightaway speed, the car handles like a sports car due to seating position and steering wheel. I felt the way I sat in that car that it was like driving my 2011 Turbo S."


