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Transmission Transformation

Automotive evolution news currently is focused on power plants whether it is electric, hybrid gas and electric or boosted gas powered by turbo or supercharger, and every other combination. But happening in the background are great advances in transmissions. Of course no power train advance occurs without the combination of power plant plus the connection that converts power to motion.

Beginning with the horseless carriage era tiny engines were connected to the rear wheels through a belt or chain in a single speed arrangement with a crude clutch of leather to handle slippage. Louis - Rene Panhard and Emile Levesson developed a three speed manual transmission in 1894. In 1898 they substituted a drive shaft for the chain and added a rear differential to manage slippage between inside and outside wheels. From those simple beginnings development happened rapidly and transmissions became surprisingly sophisticated. Even the humble Model T Ford had a two speed planetary gearbox with high and low gear managed with a single pedal without the need for a shift lever to change gear. But engineers were searching for even more sophisticated solutions that involved the early transmission computers of that day. Meanwhile the manual transmission also continued to evolve to multiple gear sets and synchronizers that aided the driver to change gears without the grinding of matching internal revolutions of spinning gear cogs between shifting. In 1928 Cadillac introduced the synchronized transmission. Even into the sixties manual gearboxes might only have synchronizers to match an up shift but not a downshift. Porsche set the standard for friction ring synchronizers for both up shift and downshift on all gears, and stuck with that design for decades. The skill of double declutching, or moving the clutch pedal for each movement of the shift lever, became a common skill for the sophisticated driver but not for the Porsche owner. The fully automatic transmission searched for the elimination of those skills and opened the way to operate their car in a trouble free manner.

As early as 1921 the first hydraulically controlled automatic transmission was patented. The Hydra – Matic appeared in an Oldsmobile in 1940 followed by the Dynaflow. Torque converter automatics appeared in 1948 and continued to evolve from two speeds through three and four speeds through the 60's. Shifting was controlled through a series of internal valve bodies acting as a crude but effective computer. One early Porsche design was the Sport –O– Matic which combined a standard three, four or five speed manual gearbox with a torque converter and a clutch activated by a switch contained in the knob of the shift lever. Pressure on the knob disengaged the clutch and allowed the shift lever to change gears. To prove the design Porsche entered a 911R with a Sport-O-Matic in 1967 in the Marathon de la Route, a 84 hour race at the Nurburgring combined Nordshlief and Sudshlief track where it won by a large margin. The transmission was a

production option as late as 1976 in 911 models and even in the 914-6.

The successor to this design was the ZF developed Tiptronic, a conventional automatic but combined with internal computer controlled solenoids. The gear shift could be over ridded with driver input but also contained algorithms that modified shift patterns based on the computer learning a drivers accelerator patterns. The Tiptronic name is owned by Porsche but ZF



sells versions to VW and various other manufacturers. Supercars like Ferrari, Aston Martin, Jaguar, Lamborghini and so on only offer versions of automatic transmissions thus totally replacing the manual transmission.

Another alternative transmission is the Constant Velocity Trans or CVT which consists of two cones linked by a steel belt. Movement of the cones varies the gear ratios without gears or shifting. It was developed for fuel efficiency by keeping the engine rpm in an optimum torque range regardless of load or road speed.

The very latest transmission design is the ZF designed Porsche Dopel-Kupplung or PDK but also produced by Getrag, Recardo, Eaton, Borg Warner and others as the DCT or Dual Clutch. It was originally designed in 1984 as a racing gearbox for the 956/962. The objective was to allow the race driver to change gears without having to lift off the gas and preventing the drop off of torque as the turbo boost was interrupted for each gear shift. After much development the PDK was offered in the 911, Boxster and Cayman beginning in 2009. It is now fitted to some 90 percent the GT3 line and the Panamera. PDK is a seven speed two gear boxes in one with two separate input shafts each with an oiled paper clutch pack and gear changes operated by pressurized hydraulic fluid through electronic shift solenoids. When one gear is selected the next gear is preselected managed by magnetic sensors. Gear changes happen in milliseconds seamlessly. You have to drive or ride in a car with PDK to appreciate the technology. While paddles can control shifts the gearbox has an automatic control that is more effective than a driver could reproduce. The PDKs ability to up shift and down shift at the optimum points of a race track is nearly magical.

The transmission transformation has taken automobile innovation a long way in a relative short time frame. The car driver especially the Porsche owner has seen some amazing developments that enhance their driving experience. Some will still say there is no substitute for the manual transmission. Others will point out the superiority of performance of the PDK and welcome it as yet another amazing advance in transmission engineering.

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

Track Day for a Rookie

It's a 2009, but with relatively low miles and after passing the Porsche mechanical inspection it became a recent Christmas present to me. It's my daily driver, which is great because I get to enjoy it that much more, but I cringed every time I drove it on a salted snowy road this past winter.

A good friend, with a 1995 968, suggested I become a member of PCA and so I soon registered. I figured I would get some good reads from the Panorama magazine and the local region's copy. At this time, I need to come clean and admit that I live in southwestern Ontario and I am registered with PCA's Upper Canada Region (UCR). It was at my first UCR lunch meeting that I learned some of what PCA membership offers a Porsche owner: tours, autocross, street survival for our kids, camaraderie and connections with other Porsche owners and track events. This is where I met Steve Carbary, a guest speaker at the UCR event. For those of us P-car owners in southern Ontario, we seem to fall into this grey zone between the UCR and SEM Regions. Steve convinced me to give the track experience at Waterford Hills a try.

I was a little hesitant as I've never driven a car of any type on a track before. In fact, while I like to think I've owned sporty cars over the years I have never owned a sports car before now. My Cayenne GTS is more sports car than SUV when compared to other SUVs such as Explorer or Highlander.

DE 101 was an eye opener for me in a good way. The instructors, Steve and Marc Molzon were very welcoming and the rookie class was a good bunch. I learned so much and this is also where

I met George Spanos from Munk's Motors. Munk's is generous enough to offer vehicle track inspections free for PCA members. George and his mechanic provided lots of great information and advice to this first time Porsche owner.

Both excitement and nerves were high in advance of the big day. The vehicle had to be prepared by removing all the contents down to the floor mats. A tote bin was loaded with anything that would be needed for the day including sunscreen, which in the end wasn't required on this cold and cloudy day – but at least it did not rain! I borrowed a helmet from a neighbor, who races dirt track, and he was even more excited for me that I was for myself. Finally, I got lots of sleep the night before knowing I had a two hour drive from home to the track.

Construction and traffic caused me to arrive a little late, so I joined the group walking the track halfway through. After I had time to chat with some of the other drivers. There was Dave Caplan with an '82 VW GTI. He was changing the road tires for track tires, once he realized I was a rookie he offered me anything I might need but not have throughout the day. By the way, Dave could really make that GTI fly. Lucas Phan was very proud to show off his convertible Miata, which must have been very cold that day. John Dorscht had an awesome set up with his 928, trailer and Hummer to pull it all. Everyone there was so friendly that I did not feel like an outsider who was out of his environment, even though clearly I was.

The instructor who was stuck with me was Tom Fielitz. Tom is a fantastic driving instructor. The first thing he did was put me at ease knowing that I was the only one at the track with a Cayenne amongst all the 911s, Caymans, Boxsters and other sports cars. I was certainly concerned having a big, heavy vehicle with a higher center of gravity, but Tom was certain that my GTS was more car like than any other SUV on the market and that being a Porsche it was made to race.

Having a driving instructor with a rookie driver was such an awesome experience. Aside from conversing back and forth, in my peripheral vision I could see Tom's hand gestures for turning, braking, where to be going into the corners, hitting the apex and coming out of the corners. It wasn't as simple as just braking, it was when to brake, how hard to brake and when to release the brakes. As I write this, I can still hear Tom saying "release" when braking and me thinking no it's too soon. But, of course Tom was correct with his wealth of driving experience.

The driving instructor wants to make this a safe and educational experience for the rookie driver. He is always making sure the driver is learning and progressing. In my fourth and final session of the day, Tom asked me what I wanted to work on. I told him I just wanted to have fun and I don't know which of us had a bigger grin as we left the paddock for the track.

As we parted at the end of the day, Tom gave me some homework to read the book Ultimate Speed Secrets by Ross Bentley. If you Google this title you will find that it is free to download. I highly recommend reading this and even as we spoke Tom said he was going to give it another review. I know I'll be back for another track day with SEM at Waterford Hills. I am also planning to register for the upcoming Detroit Grand Prix Porsche parade and day at the races. My current PCA registration is with the UCR Region, but I am giving serious thought to changing this over to SEM. My national pride tells me to stick with the Canadian club, but regionally there may be much more fun to be had in the Michigan club.

If you have not experienced High Performance Driver Education (HPDE), I strongly recommend that you give it a try. To me it was not racing as I was not competing against the other drivers, but rather pushing myself and learning what my vehicle is capable of in a track environment. I was most concerned about possible damage to my vehicle and insurance was not an option for me. But, this is a high performance track event pushing you and your car to extremes that you likely have never experienced before. It was done in a very safe setting with controlled passing restrictions and rules plus an instructor to help coach you every step of the way. Give the HDPE a try and I'm convinced that you will end the day with a grin from ear to ear.

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

- VOLUNTEER Throughout the year MI Cookie Project makes a point to give back and PAY IT FORWARD! Our bakers volunteer at the Children's Hospital Festival of Trees Preview Gala, we make meals for the homeless through Christnet, donate and sell cookies at the Down Syndrome Guild Walk at the Detroit Zoo and we donate to other fundraisers and non – profits that are in need.

Concouring Your Porsche

Here it is the first of March and everyone is looking forward to a host of Porsche Club related events this coming year. One of our premier events is the annual picnic and concours. Usually about 40 cars are judged and compete for a covetable trophy. The annual Porsche Parade also has as one of its highlights a national concours with cars from all over the USA. Over the years we have had many of our members walk away with top honors in both local and national events. In order to foster continued participation, there are resources available to our members.

Almost invaluable are a few manuals on the PCA Zone 8 website. The two most valuable are the "Guide to Concours" and "Judges Manual". To peruse this wealth of information available go to: www.zone8.org, click on events, click on Concours D'Elegance and examine all of the tips presented. They for the most part coincide with local and national concours criteria. They are specifically tailored to Porsche cars of all makes and models. Reading these manuals will hopefully incite you to take a stab at showing your car. While our picnic concours is top side only it still is a can't miss presentation.

Along with the above mentioned guides is The Chicago Region Concours School and Concours Judging School. These two separate schools provide first class instruction on how to prepare your car for concours events. The Concours School is on Sunday, March 22nd from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Napleton Westmont Porsche in Westmont, Illinois. There is a \$30.00 charge and includes lunch. The Concours Judges School is on Sunday, April 5th from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.at Fluid Motor Union in Naperville, Illinois. The fee is \$20.00 and also includes lunch. It is about a five hour drive from the Detroit area. The information obtained is a must for a serious concours enthusiast. Our members have attended these schools in the past and they are considered a great help in preparing and judging cars. The Chicago Region web site provides all of the details on these events. (www.pca-chicago.org/cms) Michael Grove at: (708) 363-1294 is the contact person. The judging school also offers inroads to volunteer as a judge on the National scene.

On the local level there is a whole cadre of members willing to help guide you through the process of preparing your car. All you have to do is ask. I personally have counseled a number of members and am always available to help prepare your car. Results published in the



P4 of previous concours winners can also provide insight into who to ask for help into turning your car into a first class entrant.

This year's Parade is in Palm Springs, California. It is thought that not a lot of our members will take the chance to show their cars there. However in 2021, we are back to French Lick, Indiana which is a reasonable driving distance away. So it is anticipated that we should have a good showing from our own SEM members. Getting a car ready to show is a process which can be started weeks or months in advance. Practice makes perfect and attention to detail is the key. And contrary to popular opinion not the shiniest car wins. In fact, I have never seen a car marked down because it was not shiny enough. But beware of water spots and wax residue. The whole idea is to take a systematic approach to detailing your car. The Zone 8 Guide gives step by step instructions with pictures and products you can use. It even gives you a time table for doing everything in a logical sequence.

Registration for the Muster opens in March 2020. If enough Porsches register there could be a corral...... remember could be!!!

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Our Porsche Travel Experience

The story of my involvement with the Porsche Travel Experience began early in 2018 on the same day that I booked a Mississippi River cruise. Later that day I learned of the first Porsche USA Route 66 Travel Experience offering. Unfortunately, I couldn't sign up because of a conflict with the river cruise which was scheduled for the same time frame. I requested to be put on the wait list for the 2019 edition of the Route 66 Travel Experience in Arizona.

As it turned out, 2019 was a much better year to enjoy the Travel Experience as it was the year of our 50th wedding anniversary and the 20th anniversary of our son's wedding. Accordingly, we invited my son Todd and his wife Bianca to enjoy the Travel Experience with us. With the combination of Porsche vehicles, Arizona roads and luxurious resort accommodations it seemed to be a natural way to celebrate these momentous accomplishments. I was contacted in early 2019 by a representative of the Travel Experience and was put on the waiting list as the 2019 Route 66 tour had not been finalized yet. In mid-February, registration for the Tour was opened and I immediately signed the four of us up. After filling out several documents we were all set for the Route 66 Travel Experience. I found it interesting that among the information requested was our preference for snacks and beverages for the rest stops.

We flew to Phoenix and were picked up by a limo provided by Porsche and taken to our accommodations in Scottsdale at the Andaz resort and Spa. We registered with Porsche and later that evening attended a cocktail hour and dinner. There we met the other seven couples participating in the Travel Experience along with the Porsche North America Program manager and the support personnel that were responsible for setting up the next five days of our Experience.

The next morning we were greeted by the Porsche crew and given information on the events for the next five days along with the rules of the road by the tour leader Richard. Each morning we would be assigned a different 911 that was ours for the day. We would have breakfast at our overnight accommodations and proceed to drive approximately 200 miles, with the drive broken up by a lunch stop and several rest stops where the driver and passenger could swap seats if they so desired. Each morning we formed up in two groups of four or five cars behind lead Porsche drivers in Cayennes. Both groups had two way radios to keep in touch with their lead driver. The lead drivers were all instructors from the Porsche Driving School at Barber Motorsport Park. Luggage transfer was handled by the support crew, picking up our bags from our rooms and depositing them in our new rooms at our next overnight stay. Hotel registration was handled by the Porsche crew and we would proceed directly to our rooms after our arrival.

During the five days of the event we rotated through five of the following 911s, all PDK equipped –

Two 2020 Carrera S RWDs - 443hp - Miami Blue and White

Two 2020 Carrera S AWDs - 443hp – Midnight Metallic Blue or Carmine Red

Two 2019 Turbo Cabriolet AWDs - 540hp – Carmine Red or GT Silver Metallic

One 2019 Targa 4S RWD - 420hp - White

Two 2019 Targa 4S AWDs – 420hp – Lava Orange or Racing Yellow

A Skittles array of colors! Retail prices of these vehicles ranged from \$150,000 to \$194,000. At the start of our drive all these vehicles had accumulated less than 2,000 miles on the

odometers, they had previously been used in a Colorado Travel Experience weeks before. They were in pristine condition – as new. At the end of each day's drive they were gassed up, cleaned and detailed by a crew Porsche brought in from California. Talk about obsessive attention to detail!

All driving was done on state and federal roads except for a surprise addition on the last day. While we did enjoy spirited driving every day, the best part of the day was driving through the twisties where the 911s were in their element. As expected, the 911s did not let us down as they comfortably, safely and easily handled the mountain curves and switchbacks.

The first morning we left Scottsdale and headed north on Highway 87 through Tonto National Forest arriving mid-afternoon in Winslow, where we stayed at the historic La Posada Hotel and later had cocktails and dinner.

The following morning, after breakfast, we posed for the obligatory photo op – 'Standing on the corner in Winslow, AZ'. Then we headed to Flagstaff where we had lunch and continued on to Sedona via the Oak Creek Canyon road – talk about twisties! Arriving in Sedona we headed to our accommodations for the next two nights – the L'Auberge de Sedona Resort and Spa along the banks of Oak Creek. Dinner that evening followed cocktails at the Edge Flagstone Patio, outdoors at L'Auberge.

The third day's drive started later in the morning as we had opportunities to enjoy either a massage or experience a sunrise hot air balloon ride. We departed for lunch in Sedona followed by more twisties, driving the Oak Creek Canyon road in the opposite direction from yesterday. After more twisties north of Sedona, we returned to L'Auberge and then to dinner and cocktails at a cowboy bar in town – the Silver Saddle.

After breakfast on day four, we headed to the historic copper mining town of Jerome, stopping to explore the city. As the day continued we drove over the Mingus Mountains toward Prescott. The twisties in the Mingus Mountains were faster, on wider roads and about the same length as those we encountered in Oak Creek Canyon. A Tee shirt available in Jerome stated there were 158 turns in 12 miles going over the mountain. We arrived in Prescott and stayed at the historic Hassayampa Inn, a restored 1927 boutique hotel, followed by cocktails and dinner at Papa's Uptown Grill.

On our last day, we headed south on scenic Route 89, arriving in Litchfield for lunch. After lunch, the participants were delighted and surprised to learn that we were going to a nearby road course – the Arizona Motorsports Park (16 turns, 2.2 miles) for some lead/ follow lapping. After signing releases, we formed into two groups of participants behind the instructors in 911s and drove several familiarization laps to get a feel for this flat course. Finally, we switched seats and went back on the track at a faster pace so the passengers had an opportunity to drive. We then rotated to the next 911 in our group and continued this way until we had driven all the 911s in our group. We were told because we didn't have helmets not to exceed 80mph – I for one saw 107mph while in the Turbo Cabriolet at the end of one of the three straights.

After the track session, we headed southeasterly towards Scottsdale and the Andaz resort again for our final night together as a group. Cocktails and dinner that evening were at a Scottsdale restaurant, The Mission Kierland. Back at Andaz we said our goodbyes and thanked the Porsche representative and his wonderful support crew for a truly fabulous week of driving these wonderful cars.

The next day, a Porsche supplied limo took us back to Sky Harbor airport for our flight to Detroit.

The Travel Experience was an excellent choice for our celebration. We had a chance to experience wonderful cars on very good driving roads plus excellent accommodations and food and best of all, family shared experiences.

Hi Zone 4 Porschephiles,


