



The Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival

7 hen was the last time you saw an Auburn, a Cord or a Duesenberg that was not in a museum or car show? Unless you are one of the few who saw a Cord at last year's Progressive Dinner, I bet the answer is never. Not so with Nancy and me.

In 2013 Nancy and I talked several times about visiting the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum in Auburn, Indiana. Then one evening while sitting at my kitchen table I asked Nancy if she wanted to go. She gave a thumbs-up. I poked around on my phone and got us a motel reservation. On the Thursday before Labor Day, we made the 3-hour drive to Auburn. After a quick burger for lunch, we headed to the museum. When we arrived, we were surprised to find an Auburn and a couple of Cord cars in the parking lot. These were the first we had seen "in the wild."

After giving these cars a good looking over, we went to the museum. The building that houses the exhibits was once part of the factory where these magnificent cars were designed and built. One end of the first floor looks like the showroom of a dealership. Its décor is in the Art Deco style and is a thing of beauty itself. Here you will find 25-30 stunning examples of Auburn, Cords,

and Duesenberg's, with a couple of Packard's thrown in for good measure. It is like a small Concours d'Elegance.

The upper story of this building houses the main car exhibits and has several restored rooms that were part of the design department in the original administration building. Most of these 200+ cars are from the first half of the 20th century and include a Tucker 48. There is also a room devoted to cars made in Indiana. once a major car manufacturing state.

That evening we had dinner at Mad Anthony Taproom in downtown Auburn. We saw several Auburn and Cord cars on the streets and learned that the city plays host to the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival each Labor Day weekend.

The next morning, we noticed a Cord parked in the lot of the motel next to ours. We walked over to look at the car, and as we got about 30 feet from it, we smelled a mustiness coming from it. This car must have been a "barn find" because it smelled like it had been stored for ages. This car was unrestored.

Later that morning we went back to the A-C-D Museum to visit its neighbor, the National Automotive and Truck Museum



of the United States. Here we found a huge collection of model cars and a vast array of old trucks and a few cars. This building was also used as a partial staging area of cars for an Auctions America collector car auction held every Labor Day weekend in Auburn, Indiana. Lots of neat cars and we were walking among them.

As we came out of this museum, we noticed 40-50 exquisite cars parked three abreast in the street next to the A-C-D Museum. They had been on a drive to the Gilmore museum and had just returned for a sit-down lunch. Quite a sight. Even though some of these cars arrived in Auburn in trucks, these cars are far from garage queens or museum relics. They are driven and enjoyed.

We have been back for this event three more times now. We missed one year because we could not get a motel reservation in Auburn. The

cars are beautiful, and the people are even better. Car nuts like Nancy and me love to talk about our cars and listen to others talk about their cars. This year, on Friday night, a full block of a street just off the town square was blocked off, and both sides were lined with cars on display. Nothing fancy or organized, just people with great cars enjoying others enjoying their cars and sharing experiences.

We tend to think of these cars in their fabulously restored state. But this year about 15%-20% of the A-C-D cars we saw were unrestored. The barn find Cord from four years ago was again present. It is at the lower end of pristine. Other unrestored cars were

almost new in quality, and we had to look closely to tell that they were unrestored. These cars only make the event more interesting.

The weekend has several formal events for the owners of these great cars, organized drives, a swap meet, lunches, cocktail parties, and dinners. But every time a couple or more of these cars are parked together is a casual gathering and draws a crowd.

The next morning, we went back to the museum and found the parking lot about half filled with all sorts of A-C-D cars. Again, nothing organized, all casual. That morning was one of the few times when I could park my 911 in a parking lot and not have to worry about door dings. I had an Auburn on one side and an Auburn boattail replica on the other side. But as magnificent

as these cars are, it is the people who make these weekends memorable.

For a great car-related getaway, head to Auburn, Indiana Labor Day weekend. There are A-C-D cars everywhere, two great car museums plus another we have not visited, a collector car auction where you are free to walk through the area where the for-sale cars are staged. This year there was also a parade/gathering of American cars. We saw several blocks worth of them lined up for some event. And best of all, lots of interesting people who share a common interest. But remember, if you plan to go, get motel reservation weeks in advance. Space is limited and gets booked quickly.

Barn find Cord

My First Sports Car...

(an invitation to tell your story)

Alfa in the City – Fetching a 1971 Alfa Romeo GTV

eez, I wish I still had that car back. Well, maybe not this exact car, but one like it! This story is a car story about a car journey, not so much about the car. The car turned out to be a good car, reliable and so much fun to drive. Including at no extra charge that famous Alfa lean in the corners.

The impulse of youth drew me to the Alfa Romeo. Although a first-generation German, I was in love with Italian cars. I gravitated to the emotion of the Alfa marque. The sight, oh, those sexy lines, a five-speed, fuel injection, four-wheel discs, all in 1971! But, what got me going was the sound of that 1750 cc, dual overhead cam engine winding out. Wow, in anticipation of a cacophony of aural sound and sight, I bought an Alfa Romeo GTV from an AutoWeek ad.

It was natural that I would find the Alfa for sale in the

classified section of AutoWeek magazine. It was 1984, and I was the advertising manager of AutoWeek. Calling the seller, I learned that the car was stock, with the Spica mechanical fuel injection still intact and in good working order. It had no rust, a southern car located in Oklahoma City, 1000 miles and 15+ hours away.

What could go wrong with this deal? I'm young remember. The seller is an AutoWeek reader, a straight shooter and the car's a mere stone throws away. Oh, the folly of youth. I made the deal sight unseen, over the phone, May Day, 1984. For some reason, I still have some paperwork and the phone messages from the day. One message indicates that I negotiated the owner down from \$3000

to \$2650. I sure wish I had that car back.

Whatever the price, I was excited, my first real sports car! Lucky stroke for me at AutoWeek, I was in and amongst a bunch of car crazy's like me. Pondering how I would get the car back, one of my colleagues, Phil Buck, a Waterford Hills racer who raced a Green, Fiat 128 said, let's get the car. What, drive there, I said? Yes, he said. Phil was one of those guys, after all, who races a green car, yet alone a Fiat 128? Well, that's Phil, a bit eccentric, but the real deal, a real car guy. Driving down sounded like a plan. I'd have to pay for a couple of hotel rooms, some gas, and some good company. The trick was leaving on a Friday and returning on a Sunday, going 2000 miles, sure, why not, we're young. So, we did!

From what I remember the travel down together, was pure bonding, no-stop talk. If I recall, correctly we drove almost 700 miles on that Friday so that we could be in Oklahoma City by the afternoon to pick up the car and hustle our way back home.

We arrived at Steve Lambers' home in Oklahoma City



mid-afternoon on Saturday. Steve met us, I took the car for a drive and completed the deal. We turned that car and pointed NE and headed back to Detroit. The only trouble I remember with the car was a driving rainstorm in the plains. Alfa wasn't concerned about clearing the windshield of rain, at least this GTV's wipers weren't quite up to the task. I recall checking the oil about halfway through, and it wasn't even using any oil. I also remember pushing it a bit hitting 80 or 90 mph occasionally, no trouble. No shakes, no rattles it may have drifted a bit but, that was probably the wind buffeting the car. On the way back we even found our way to the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. I've since been back to the museum four times.

What this deal taught me was that people could be trustworthy, not everybody selling you a car is out to screw you to the floor. Next, long-distance car travel in America is easy.

Gas stations, hotels and food are everywhere, thank you Holiday Inn and McDonald's. If you break down, there's always a tow truck, a rental car, or train or a bus home and a shipper for the car. This trip was a pattern for me later in life.

I've crossed the country no less than ten times, picking up a car or truck in faraway Portland Oregon, Carmel California, Indianapolis Indiana or wherever. I've bought Suburban's off the Bureau of Land Management in Elko, Nevada, and Grand Junction Colorado at auction. Amtrak is fun and a great way to go to Grand Junction, but we'll save that for another story. I've bought Land Rovers from a good, newly acquired friend in Portland, OR., who just loved those 88's and 109 Land Rovers.

One of the Land Rovers I brought back, I traded to the Ferrari Dealer at the time in Dearborn, Bob Schneider at the Sports Car Exchange. I traded him the Land Rover 109 for a new 1987 demo, Alfa Romeo Milano. I traded the Milano to Phil Buck, the same Phil, my companion on this trip for a 1967 Alfa Duetto Spider. I kept that Duetto for 30 years! That funded my car hobby.

What a journey both literally and figuratively. Buying cars and fetching them by plane, or rail became a craving. In fact, my 2000 Cab, 996, came by way of a road trip to Indianapolis and a drive home. I'll tell you a secret, when I discovered that I could wrap a new car into a trip for my wife, suddenly, my car hobby from my wife's perspective wasn't just "his hobby" now, but our hobby.

It's better guys, I'm sure you know when she's' with you in the car hobby mentally, physically and spiritually than against you. Thank you 1971 Alfa Romeo GTV! We've seen more of America by a back road, and the better for it. What a great country, and now we still do it but it's done, not with Phil anymore, but with my best friend and wife, Gail. Here's to you honey and the next object of desire, how about a 997 turbo in Santa Fe? I think I need a trip!



Car Enthusiast Levels

any people profess to be car enthusiasts, but not all enthusiasts are the same. Some people are way more immersed in car enthusiasm than others. The levels of enthusiasm can be obvious or subtle. Rather than be judged by others, maybe it is best done by retrospection than by being called out publicly. It is probably best if we recognize our level of enthusiasm rather than try to act out a false enthusiasm to fit into the true enthusiast's circle. Let's look at some of the symptoms and failings of the true car enthusiast and the pretend enthusiast.

One of the true requirements of a car enthusiast is to own a suitable car or car collection. The collection can fall into several categories from classic to contemporary exotic. If you want to hang with the hot rod crowd, obviously that will require a hot rod. You cannot call any old car a hot rod. If you can't find it in the pages of a hot rod magazine chances are it is not a recognized hot rod. If you want respect in the classic car crowd, you cannot pretend that your Ford LTD II is a classic even if it is the last known running example.

If you expect to mingle with the sports car crowd, do not try to pass off your four-door sedan or worse yet your sporty SUV as a sports car regardless of whether the manufacturer splashed the chrome tag of SPORT on every fender. The fact that you have a dozen derelict cars scattered around your property makes you a hoarder and not a car collector. What we are searching for are relevance, desirability, and provenience. In other words, no amount of self-proclamation makes your car or car collection the definition of you as a car enthusiast. You aren't cool because you say you are cool and your car or cars follow suit. The true car enthusiasts I have met are self-depreciating, modest, and don't boast about their cars. Other people judge them as a car enthusiast, and they don't proclaim it themselves.

There are probably a lot of good reasons not to be a car enthusiast. A relative few can leverage their car enthusiasm into a career or at least into a profitable hobby. The majority of car enthusiasts have a small circle of friends who are fellow car enthusiasts and the feature they most share is that they lack a reasonable and well-rounded diversity of interests and friends. Car events dominate their social calendar as well as much of their reading materials. There is also the strong probability that their garage is better decorated and more orderly than their living quarters. More thought may be put into car themed decoration of their garage and den than to actual living spaces

in their home. They are far more likely to have all of the latest tools and car products than they are to have matching eating and cooking utensils or even matching plates. The refrigerator and pantry may be bare, but the garage will have enough oil and maintenance fluids to put any professional car mechanic to shame, and that includes spare parts and full collections of nuts, bolts, and washers. The truly paranoid has the local parts store on speed dial, and the insane are on the distribution route of Snap-On and Matco tool trucks.



The dedicated car enthusiast likes to prove the depth of his enthusiasm by how much time he dedicates to his hobby. At the most basic level, the car enthusiast may wash and wax their car. The fanatic will expand that to a full detailing, and the fully respected enthusiast prepares his car for competition. The basic enthusiast can change his oil, the fanatic does most of his car maintenance, and the maniac does his engine rebuilds. You will only get the respect of a car enthusiast at the same peer level of involvement that the other enthusiast has. Don't expect to fit into the car enthusiast crowd that exclusively works on their car when your involvement falls into the category of dropping your credit card on the desk of your car detailer shop desk.

The true car enthusiast is knowledgeable about his car hobby and perhaps has expert level knowledge about his niche of car interest, whether hot rod, custom, classic or contemporary modern. The next level car enthusiast probably has a library of car books and a wide breadth of car magazine subscriptions. The fanatic car enthusiast has written his car book or contributes stories to car magazines. Another form of fanatic takes copious pictures of cars and has a basement full of picture albums of cars. Isn't acceptable enough to be able to drop the name of famous car people you have met. It is respectable that other recognized car enthusiasts know you as a personal friend.

We all want to be recognized car enthusiasts. The best way is not to try too hard and to be genuine about how much you care about the car hobby and the people who share that enthusiasm with you.



IN THE SHARK TANK

Saying Goodbye

'm not leaving yet, so relax. A few weeks ago, I said goodbye to my supercharged Euro 1985 Porsche 928 S. After 5 years of where we will and restoration, it was time to say goodbye. In previous installments of this article I documented how I bought this car with a blown motor, rebuilt it, had it blow up on me, rebuilt it again, and then enjoyed it for several years. Here's a short recap.

The car looked like was in really nice shape, but I knew the engine was sick. It had a 5-speed manual transmission and a supercharger setup that was very clean, so it had that going for it. I bought it for \$8,000, which was probably a bit high considering the engine was probably junk. After I got it home, I inspected the cylinder bores and found they were heavily scored and the piston tops looked like they had been chewing on nuts and bolts. All signs of heavy knock.

I pulled the motor and found all rings were broken causing the sharp edges of the small pieces to gouge the bores. Basically, the engine was a goner. I bought a replacement engine and had my son and daughter help me slowly fix it up and reinstall it. After about 9 months the car was on the road. I retuned it and thought I had it ready to go.

On its maiden drive, the tiny little drive belt that synchronizes the two distributors broke causing catastrophic damage to the cam shaft on one side. This prompted removing the engine again and fixing the cam and distributor. A month later, everything was back together and the car was again on the road. It sounded amazing and was quite the looker.

A few small issues like the rear ABS sensors and brake master cylinder arose over the following three or so years, nothing major in my book and just par for the course. It had become a very reliable car. But this past spring, I realized that I was neglecting my 1991 928 GT, so I decided it was time to say goodbye to the 1985 928 S.

After fixing the notorious odometer gear that had just failed, it was time to post it for sale. It was not a show car and would never be, as evidenced by its ranking in the annual SEMPCA picnic concourse, but it was nice clean driver. Very nice paint, good interior, and a clean (modified) engine.

I took a ton of photos and posted it on eBay. I thought it was worth \$20,000, but at that price there were no nibbles. I dropped



After mingling and checking out all those marvelous Porsches, it was finally driving time. We needed to see those beautiful tree colors.


