

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
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#### President's Column





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#### M1-WOODWARD CHRONOGRAPH

M1-Woodward Avenue is a highway notably referred to as Detroit's Main Street and follows the route of the old Saginaw Trail that linked Detroit with Pontiac, and at the time, Flint and Saginaw.

Woodward Avenue was created after a devastating fire in 1805 and is one of five principal avenues in Detroit devised by Augustus B. Woodward as part of a street plan intended to make Detroit the Paris of the West, by emulating it's wide avenues.

Woodward Avenue was the location of the first mile of concrete roadway in the entire country and in 1970, bore the M1 designation. Woodward Avenue is synonymous with cruising.

By 1958, Woodward Avenue was the place to be for unofficial car racing and today continues to celebrate Detroit's automotive history with a Dream Cruise, taking place during August of each year.

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#### What Just Happened

Even if you are very experienced and observant it is really difficult, bordering on impossible, to be able to interpret and feedback what happens driving on a race track. As a driving instructor this is what we are supposed to be trained to do. It is our primary function and purpose to provide instruction and feedback to a student. The student should be free to concentrate on driving and depend on the instructor to observe and feedback those actions for purposes of learning areas of improvement and driving behaviors. I am here to admit that this is very difficult to do especially in real time with any certainty and accuracy. This is most certainly true as speed increases, but also as talent improves and errors become more miniscule. For a beginner student the errors are more obvious and easier to detect. When searching for the last bit of improvement, it becomes very difficult to the naked eye and normal human sensation to detect and file away in the brain what just happened. Thus, being your own instructor is an almost impossible function. It is also why data and video recording devices become essential learning tools. The secret to good instruction is to be able to quickly interpret what just happened on the track and determine a corrective action, within a few seconds, that it can be offered to the student for the next lap. Any sooner and it is a distraction to the driver and not absorbed for corrective action. Any later and any chance of learning is also lost. A successful compromise is a debriefing at the end of the session where the student and instructor have an opportunity to walk through a problem and seek a corrective action. It is also very difficult to separate what just happened into a segment that can be studied or even recalled accurately. Again, this becomes a rare skill that is seldom achieved. The more experience that an instructor and student share will also contribute to the success in the interaction and especially the effectiveness of communication.

My two favorite instructional books are Carroll Smith's Drive to Win and Ross Bentley's Ultimate Speed Secrets. Both writers have very successful backgrounds in both instruction and in being able to tune cars for performance. Both had great success because of engineering backgrounds and in being able to direct tuning changes in the car, but also modifications to the driver's behavior. Both are great advocates of testing, but also of documenting. Both advocate keeping a log or diary of testing and also of events. In fact, nothing is learned if

there isn't feedback documented every time a change is performed and an event is interpreted and written down. Many drivers, both professional and amateur, keep such logs and this has expanded to keeping electronic and now video records. Keeping simple records such as track conditions, weather conditions and even tire temperature plus tire pressures can provide valuable base lines as well as useful learning points for interpreting results. Both Smith and Bentley offer suggested formats for log sheets. I used a format and shared it with my friends that was developed by the Kenny Brown Ford racing team.

You don't need to have an engineering degree or the support of a dedicated race engineer like the professional racers have. But, if you keep track like the successful drivers and teams do, you usually find that it is the case that one goes along with the other. You can very often find the case where a very talented racer seems to be plagued with bad luck or a very unproductive career only to realize their lack of education or ineffective communication with their team or mechanics is the underlying cause.

In my decades of writing about racing for magazines, I have had the opportunities to study successful drivers and teams. Penske and Ganassi are two of those teams that know how to invest in the right factors to promote success and winning. I once had the opportunity to interview Tim Cindric who is a team manager for Penske and has had tremendous success at the big races such as the Indy 500, winning it more than any other team. I was most curious about the feedback between driver and engineer. He surprised me by telling me that most of their drivers did not provide critical feedback that could be interpreted into changes in the car set up. The one exception was Rick Mears, who was a total student of racing to the point that he was retained by Penske to teach the other drivers. He was also the one driver that the engineers trusted for useful car setup feedback. Rick knew how to use the adjustment tools built into the race car such as the weight jacker, brake bias and such to optimize the car not only for each lap but for each corner. That is how you become a four time winner.

As people who drive for fun, it is useful to understand how the good drivers achieve success while we enjoy our own level of driving. Fortunately for me, and most of my friends, we can have a comfortable level of driving without being professional race drivers.

Normally during the winter in Michigan you do not get many spring like days to enjoy in February. This year our Porsche Club was blessed with one of those days to enjoy a Saturday morning tour of the original Ford Motor Company Model T Plant. Nearly 60 Club members turned out February 10th for an hour and a half guided tour of The Ford Piquette Plant located on Piquette Avenue and Beaubien Boulevard in Detroit's "Milwaukee Junction" area.

"The Ford Piquette Avenue Plant is a former factory located within the Milwaukee Junction area of Detroit, Michigan. Built in 1904, it was the second center of automobile production for the Ford Motor Company, after

the Ford Mack Avenue Plant. At the Piquette Avenue Plant, the company created and first produced the Ford Model T, the car credited with initiating the mass use of automobiles in the United States. Prior to the Model T, several other car models were assembled at the factory. Early experiments using a moving assembly line to make cars were also conducted there. It was also the first factory where more than 100 cars were assembled in one day. While it was headquartered at the Piquette Avenue Plant, Ford Motor Company became the biggest U.S. based automaker, and it would remain so until the mid-1920s. The factory was used by the company until 1910, when its car production activity was relocated to the new, bigger Highland Park Ford Plant." (Source-Ford Piquette Website)



Our tour began in the museum theater where a 25 minute video was viewed covering the history of the plant and the restoration that took place to bring the old plant building to it's current condition. Due to the large SEM/PCA attendance we were divided into two groups. One group started on the second floor and the other on the third floor. The museum actually consists of three floors, but currently only the second and third floors have displays while the first floor is undergoing restoration.

Our group started on the second floor at the Piquette Street end. At this end Henry Ford's office has been restored with many original artifacts. Some of those include the original company safe and the telescope that Henry Ford used to observe his surroundings. Our presenter told us that Ford like to look at the birds in the area as well as spying on the other automotive plants. The Studebaker Plant was next door to the Piquette Plant during the early 1900s.



From there we toured the remainder of second floor, walking past many of the "alphabet cars" that Henry developed prior to the Model T and manufactured at the Piquette Plant.

Our presenter provided many interesting stories about them. One vehicle of interest was a replica, under construction by the museum staff, of Henry Ford's first car the "Quadricycle". At the end of that floor was the "secret room" where Ford and certain select employees developed the Model T. This room is being replicated in the exact location and with many of its original pieces of furniture and equipment.

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
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The third floor contained a large collection of vehicles from the Piquette era plant. As we walked the floor our presenter used his vast knowledge to provide insight into them. There were several versions of Model T "speedsters" on display, each one was unique. A bright yellow one stuck out from the others of the group. So the speedster concept evolved quite some time before our beloved Porsche version.


It did not seem possible that an hour and a half tour went by so quickly. Like most museums, it takes more than one visit to take it all in.

After the tour, many of the participants gathered in Dearborn for lunch at Ford's Garage on Michigan Avenue. For those who have not been there, Ford's Garage is a themed restaurant based upon the Ford Model A. Throughout the restaurant there is memorabilia related to that Ford era. Noted for their burgers, each bun is embossed with the famed "Ford Oval".

For those who could not attend, the museum is open Wednesday through Sunday. Check their website for times and public tours. This is one of the must see museums in the Motor City area.

It may be a year away, but expect another museum tour in February 2025. ■





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#### What Doesn't Kill You, Makes You Stronger

It was November of 2020. We had just gone through COVID and things were starting to change. My wife and I decided to take a trip back home to Minnesota to see family. Because of COVID, I was working from home but in the future there might not be many opportunities to travel back home to spend a few weeks seeing family and continue working remotely.

One morning I got a voicemail stating that my car might be in the impound lot. Thinking in my head, "my car... impound lot, I think they have the wrong person." Before I left on my trip, I had taken the car to the wash. Got a new car cover. Purchased a new extension cord so I could charge the battery while I was gone. She was ready for her winter slumber. I drove her as much as I could until this trip, then put her away and flew off for Thanksgiving.

I called the number back, it was in fact my car. "Why was my car there?" I thought in my head. I reached out to the office of the apartment complex we were living at the time and they stated that a few kids came into the lot just before dark and because my car was parked in the back along with some others, the kids not only threw rocks at it but they jumped on it as well and then ran off.

I was devastated, "they did what?!"

Sometimes life gives you lemons. I have been given a few of those, maybe too many. At a young age I learned how to turn those lemons into lemonade, then lemon pie and then into a nice shot of Limoncello! I was great at turning bad into good, negative into positive, always seeing the bright side of a gloomy day; but this was tough to deal with.

It was hard for me to tell anyone about this because I felt like I sounded like a rich guy complaining. "Guess what, my Porsche was damaged. Boo-hoo." I loved cars and for something to have happened to mine it was tough after I spent the last 7+ years saving up for one. I spent countless hours thinking, crunching numbers on spreadsheets and deciding that this was going to be the car to buy that would be largest cash purchase in my life. I felt like I didn't speak for a week. I just kept thinking why or what I would do if I caught the kids. What's next, how do I even deal with this?

One day it hit me, "This hurt. Like it really hurt, but what doesn't kill me, makes me stronger, right." I grabbed a journal and made my first entry. "This fueled a fire within me to forgive, but not to forget. What doesn't kill you, makes you stronger!" At this point I realized that they were adolescent kids and even though what they did was wrong, they didn't know any better. They might not have any prominent figures or mentors in their life. Instead of punishing them, I felt that I should opt to guide them and help them navigate this thing called life.

From there the rebuilding journey began. After saving all the money to purchase the car, the vandalism happened when I had no comprehensive insurance. \$10K worth of damage and it was all on me. I paid for the replacement of both front and rear windshields in order to get my car out of the impound lot. Then I went through some life changes, new job, new house, new baby, it was almost two years before I was able to finally have a garage and some time to actually work on the car. I also had to save up money for all the repairs.

My first car was a Honda Civic. I took that baby to the drag strip, even street raced a little. After Fast and Furious, a nitrous bottle definitely went into the trunk. From there, I picked up a Nissan 240SX because the drift scene was starting to sweep through the nation. It was different, fun and cool.
