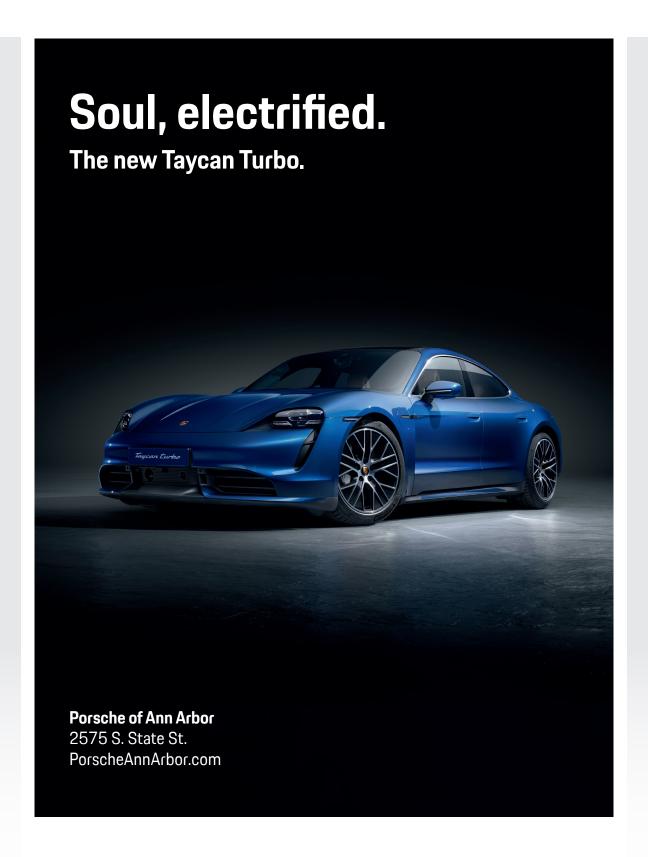

Intake Stacks

Chances are that today's contemporary Porsche owner doesn't even know of or understand the traditional intake stack systems found on most Porsches from 1965 to 1998. If you have never seen these mechanical pieces, so fundamental to any six cylinder and some of the four cylinder models, you may have to search your Panorama magazine for one of those PMO Induction advertisements to get an understanding of them. The pictures depict a typical gang of three pipes that contain throttle valves regulating air flow to the individual cylinders located below them. These throttle bodies came in different configurations also. Racing throttle bodies came with standard and higher positioned butterfly valves or with a plate commonly referred to as a slide system where holes are opened. The butterfly system could be adjusted for each individual throttle, but the slide system was a simple hole in a moving plate and not very well suited for street use. They were typically used with fuel injection systems, but also could be found on a carburetor for one bank consisting of fuel float bowls and metering jets arranged in a very unique set up typical of six cylinders engines. Four-cylinder engines, found in every 356 model and also later four cylinder models, used a two-barrel carburetor system. On top of the carburetors, or injection stacks, was a velocity stack which had a tapered conical shape intended to speed up air flow. These velocity stacks were metal on carburetors and some injection stacks, but also could be plastic or even molded into the top of the injection stack itself. Production cars also had an air filter box mounted above the carburetors or injection stacks that many owners swapped out for individual filters consisting of plates separated by a mesh screen and a foam filter element. There were many suppliers of these filter units with cleanable foam elements.

All of these systems disappeared with the advent of electronic injection systems and especially with the introduction of turbo charging. When I open the engine lid of my 1972 911, the individual injection stacks sit prominently on display. I often have to explain to the curious onlooker that their modern six-cylinder motor looks much like my ancient six, except that they are covered by an elaborate series of plastic decorative covers. Perhaps, the current engineering staff is embarrassed to display the

complex system of pipes and hoses of a modern injection system. Of course, the efficiency and power of the modern six cylinder engines would not be possible without the use of the immensely complicated modern injection system. The other change that evolved with these modern injection systems is one throttle body feeding into separate runners for each cylinder. Porsche incorporated valve technology into the intake manifold that could vary the length of these runners to optimize air flow and mixture, depending on engine speed and flow characteristics, to maximize torque at each operating condition.

From elegant gangs of carburetors with effective throttle stacks, we have evolved into sophisticated injection systems that may not look impressive but do produce spectacular power and performance. Tuning of these systems has also greatly evolved. The carburetor systems may have seemed simple, but it took a lot of mechanical skill to extract performance with drivability. Setting the mixture on the carburetors was almost an art as I learned from the dual Solex on my 356 and triple throat Webers on my 914-6. Changes in the weather affected the running as would adjusting the flow of each carburetor barrel and synchronizing the opening of both banks. A service tool, called a Uni-Syn, and special skills were essential to measure how much air flow went to each cylinder. The fuel injection systems managed much of the turning with a sophistical injection pump that more accurately metered gas to each individual cylinder with a series of precisely engineered injectors. But, these systems required their own tuning skills for adjusting idle air flow and synchronizing the opening of each throttle body valve. Since each butterfly valve was operated by its own control rod, as well as the rod to the injector pump, it was critical to set each rod to the correct length and synchronize all of the rods to operate smoothly and in a uniform fashion. Again, the modern injection systems handle these functions with sophisticated computer management.

It may result in plastic covers over complicated engine management systems, but the trade off in performance and drivability are well worth it.

Designing and Building a Sports Car

As Porsche owners, we share a love of sports cars. My interest in them started when I was exposed to the wonderful world of GM Styling, the 1959 Sting Ray racecar was the car that dreams were made of. That was the beauty that inspired the 1963 Corvette. The Fisher Body Craftsman Guild, a competition to design and build model cars resulted in my winning trips to Detroit. Included in this experience was meeting GM designers and discovering you could make a good living designing cars...Who knew?

These experiences resulted in my attending the Art Center College of Design in LA. After graduation, Ford offered me a position and I started in the Mustang Studio. Designing Mustangs was as close to designing sports cars as I would get in my 35 years at Ford. I did make the ultimate corporate no-no and bought a Corvette not long after being hired. As a 21 year old, understanding corporate politics was a minor priority.

A lot of designers dream of creating their own car, but for many reasons few do. In the 70's, I had returned from a

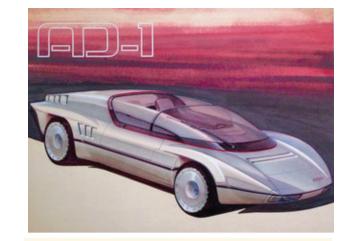
foreign assignment designing cars in Australia and the idea of a sports car of my own design began formulating. I was driving a Pantera, my first management lease car, and thought, this thing is fast and good looking, but not really a well thought out car!

I decided that if I was going to successfully build a car, I needed a light chassis, suspension and powertrain. What I wanted was something I could put a fiberglass body on of my own design. The VW Bug was the answer and I became the proud owner of a used '69 Beetle.

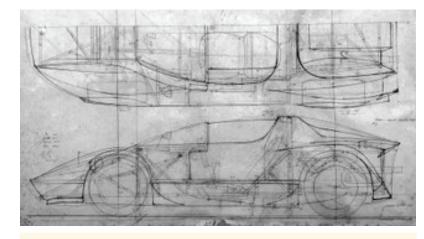
As with any automotive project, I started with people packaging and arrived at an overall size. Cost and timing was also looked at, but unlike auto manufacturers, I had no

build date. It would take as long as it took to get it right! The VW Beetle floor pan was ideal for the wheelbase, but I would have to lower the seat area to achieve a proper seating position and maintain the height, width and length proportions for a sports car. To support the fiberglass body panels I decided to construct a one inch square steel tube chassis that would also give the car the needed torsional rigidity. I built a scale model to try out various designs providing maximum rigidity vs. minimum weight.

As I was establishing the proportions, I started the concept sketches. I knew that the traditional way to create a fiberglass body was very labor intensive. Constructing a full size clay model, plaster molds and a lot of hand laid fiberglass was not a realistic one-man operation! I found an excellent solution, a racecar fabricator in California was selling first generation Can Am type bodies. This builder would also add additional layers of fiberglass cloth to the body, which was important for

a street driven sports car. I knew that it would be much easier to modify an existing shape than to create a new one from scratch.

The Art Center curriculum included learning how to work with fiberglass, but NOT welding. A high school welding class helped me construct the tube chassis, but a pro welder did attach the 3" roll bar. I don't like to take chances with my head!

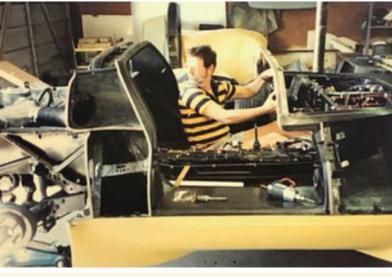
Once the chassis was completed, I modified and attached the body panels. Every panel of the car body I purchased was changed to achieve my design! The panels located between the wheels were the only ones permanently attached to the chassis, all other panels were bolted on and removable for painting.

I used two 1978 Corvette backlights, one for the windshield and the other in the rear. The single arm windshield wiper was a unique engineering problem only solved by building a working scale model. The headlamps were exposed with an electric dropping panel. The doors represented a huge problem both in operation and weather sealing. Two gas struts were used per single hinged door. The Plexiglas side glass was attach to the door and is not removable. The only Ford parts in the entire car were the Pantera exterior door handles. A full belly pan was added to improve aero. A Ford aerodynamicist friend estimated the drag CD as .32 with the top on. The cloth top was folded and stored behind the seats when not in use.

The body was painted Guards Red lacquer in my garage, one panel at a time. The great thing about lacquer is you just spray it on, wet sanding and rubbing it out is what finishes it.

The interior was fun, with some sewing help from my wife and one of our trim shop guys who did work on the side. He did a beautiful job on the bucket seats purchased from the junkyard. The instrument panel was connected to the steering column and is height adjustable. The center panel with gauges and radio is adjustable to face the driver. All the fabrics were purchased from a store that sold unused old auto industry fabrics, quite a deal!

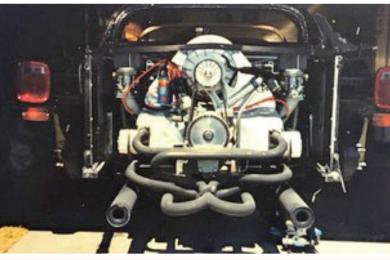
The powertrain was the only part of the project I did not do myself. I had the VW engine built by a gentleman who raced VW powered vehicles. He did the full hot rod treatment; bored and stroked to 2 liters, dual downdraft Webers and high compression heads. I think he estimated the output to be about 120 – 130 HP. Not bad for an 1800 lb. car. Stopping power was provided by aftermarket four-wheel



AD-1 with driver

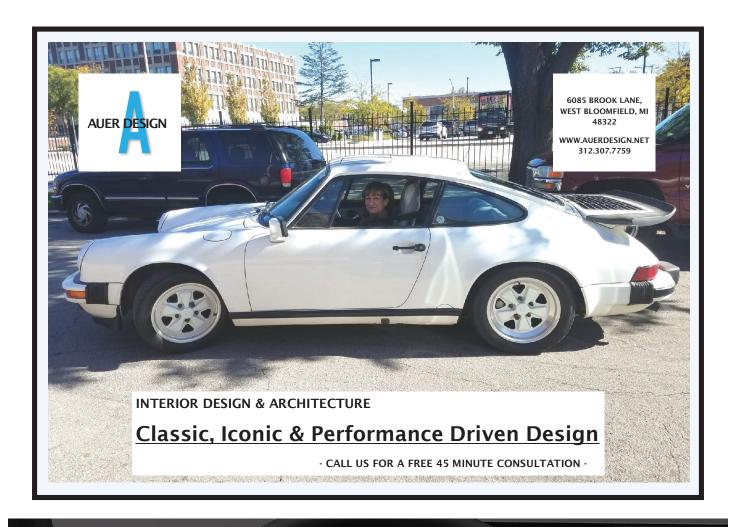


Wiring was a nighmare, especially the instrument panel

disc brakes. The suspension was modified to be height adjustable. In the 70's, 15 inch wheels were about as large as I could afford. To enhance the wheel-tire appearance I created thin fiberglass wheel covers that extended over the side of the tires. This created a lower profile looking tire and an 18 inch looking wheel.

The vehicle was finished in 1989 and named the AD-1, for Aikins Design-One. That year, I was invited to bring it to one of the first Eyes on Design car shows and was very surprised to win a first place in my class. Personally, I was just happy that the car made it to the Grosse Point show on its first long distance drive! To me, the AD-1 was more of a show car than a driver's car. Driving it was a unique experience, especially if you liked answering questions. It was more fun driving my Boxster S. As a result the AD-1 spent a lot of time in my garage, which the hot rod engine didn't like.

Sometimes people ask me why it took me 10 years to create this car. My explanation is that I was still working 8-10 hours a day at Ford, trying to stay happily married and raising a family of two energetic boys! My greatest satisfaction was completing my dream car, winning a couple of car show awards was icing on the cake. I finally parted with the AD-1 a few years ago, with only 1500 miles on the odometer. The new owner is a young, good family friend of ours. His goal is to restore the aging fiberglass body, add a new paint job and get it back on the road. I wish him well!

When looking at the AD-1 photographs, please remember this is a mid-1970's design. ■
